Carrying heavy loads of water on their head, severely impacted their physical health.

Adolescent girls, pregnant women and elderly too had to go through the ordeal. Life was tough.

Our decision to work in Chikhaldara block was based on recommendations made by the District Administration, Amravati. There are two main factors – one, it is a remote, tribal region and second, the acute shortage of water that had made the lives of its inhabitants miserable.

The then District Collector helped us understand the urgent need for the intervention in Chikhaldara block. He informed us that as it is a hilly area, rainwater runs off without recharging the ground water. This has led to perennial water crisis in the region.


Water for People India, after several rounds of meeting with district administration and understanding the chronic water crisis in the area, decided to work in the region.

I am a resident of Hirdamal village. Earlier, we would walk for hours to fetch water for our daily use. Today, Water for People has made our lives easier. They have repaired the faulty water taps and have constructed water reservoirs in our village





The first and foremost step is the problem analysis – Is the water source perennial and sustainable? Is there a need for constructing a new water reservoir at an appropriate location or the old one is required to be repaired?



Community members come together to find answers and implement the solution. Right from excavation work to installing the pipelines, community members voluntarily contribute their 'physical hardwork' the Shramdaan!

The Shramdaan allows them to participate in these activities with a sense of ownership. They take more interest in maintaining the water pipelines, reservoirs and in creating awareness among their peers regarding water conservation. Some of the work, like excavation of pipeline, was also done under MGNREGA.



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> SUSTAINABILITY

In Khatkali village, we have formed Water User Committee to supervise the water usage and maintenance of water pipes and reservoirs. As members of this committee, we have divided the responsibilities among ourselves. Some are responsible for the water tank while other groups of members look after the pipeline and taps. Water for People has made us self-sufficient. We feel confident and proud while performing our duties.

Water For People India's idea of forming 'Water User Committees' in villages of intervention, has turned out to be a great success.





> SKILL BUILDING AND LIVELIHOOD

I have been trained to work as a 'Waterman' in my village. The kit provided by Water for People includes a drilling machine, a cutter, and tools that can repair faulty water taps. Whenever a tap is broken or if there is a slight leakage, I repair it using the toolkit. This training has benefited all the watermen in different ways. Today, I work in the neighboring villages and earn anything between INR 50 to 100 per day.

To ensure that community members do not have to rely on outside help, Water For People India built the capacity of individuals in these villages offering them an opportunity to assist the villagers and earning a livelihood simultaneously for themselves.









> CONSERVING WATER/RESPONSIBLE WATER USAGE

We used to fetch water from sources located far away from our villages. Today, we have water pipeline here. Water for People has taught us the importance and ways of conserving water. In case the water overflows from the taps, it goes directly to the kitchen gardens through a drain.



Along with providing access to water, Water For People India created awareness among villagers towards mindful usage of water.



In their monthly meetings, Water User Committees – guided by members of Water For People India, make sure to discuss with villagers the different ways in which they can conserve water

The concept of Kitchen Gardens has really intrigued the villagers through which they are not only conserving water but are growing fresh, green vegetables in their backyard.




Another impact of this initiative by Water For People India has been the increased efficacy of the local governance systems like Panchayats, Anganwadi Centres and Government Schools.

There was no water station in our school. Our students were facing several challenges related to water. All the students and teachers would stand in the same que for drinking water. A lot of time was wasted, and they would come late to their classes. Now that we have a water station in our school, students do not face any problem and time is also saved.



Inspired by the enthusiasm shown by children in meetings organized in schools, Water For People India formed Child Cabinets in village schools.

After initial guidance on maintaining WASH practices in schools, responsibilities were divided among members of these Child Cabinets. Some look after the kitchen hygiene while others are responsible for maintaining cleanliness in the school premises.





Today, these children are leading the way for a better, healthier tomorrow by creating awareness on water and water related areas like WASH in their schools, families and societies.

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> AWARENESS ON MENSTRUAL HEALTH MANAGEMENT

Changes have been observed in the behavior of girls regarding menstruation. Earlier, they hesitated to talk about anything remotely related to menstruation. Our consistent efforts to create awareness among them related menstrual health management has led to girls becoming confident about sharing their concerns related to their menstrual health. The training sessions organized by Water for People has inspired girls to maintain personal cleanliness and hygiene.



Availability and Accessibility to water directly impacts the Menstrual Health of Adolescent girls. In areas dominated by water scarcity, it is the health of the menstruating girls and women that suffers the most.
